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Abol Tabol: An Interpretation beyond 'Nonsense'

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Abstract: The pendulum of the mind alternates between sense and nonsense, not between right and wrong. This quote of Carl Jung talks of an interesting interface between sense and nonsense and the human psyche. Nonsense, often used either as derogatory or fanciful, always presupposes sense; rather, nonsense is ever burdened with sense. Does that mean non-sense has no sense? Or does nonsense have more sense? Both these rhetorical questions will have affirmative answers. Alice's adventures in wonderland has no sense but a Frabjous Day, a portmanteau coinage, does convey sense because it includes fair, fabulous and joyous celebration essential to human existence. However, it is (im)possible to have porcochard (a combination of pochard and porcupine) because it refutes all 'grammar' i.e. convention. The Griffonling is 'indisposed to mirth' whereas merriment too is indispensable to survival. Sukumar Ray, the exceptional stellar litterateur of the early twentieth century, challenged the basic idea of sense through his nonsense, Rhymes without Reason, Abol Tabol. This paper offers a critical study of Ray's masterpiece, that ushers in more insightful reading giving more reason or 'sense' to this apparent 'nonsense.'
