Durga Worship-from a Cult to a Festival

In this paper, I will outline the regional confluences while establishing the chronology of worshipping Durga Puja in Bengal, till the early colonial period. The rites and the customs would be touched upon in a nuanced form. My argument primarily is linked to the fact that the celebration of Durga puja was nothing less than of a utsab, denoting the display of wealth, status and authority yet conforming to a syncretistic idea bypassing the popularity of Vaishnava traditions. I would want to establish the Durga puja as a cult based on Shakti and Tantric ideas. The socio-political factors embraced this festival which adhered to being the identity and the cultural mark of the Bengalis. I would elaborate on the fact that by interweaving the socio-cultural and economic reasons behind unmasking the Sarbojanin utsab. The question, therefore which lingers on was whether celebrating Durga puja acted as a social platform for admitting one-self into the upper echelons of the social heirarchy ladder or whether it could be simply regarded as the marker of identity with a specific vernacular speaking geographical region? The Goddess is celebrated in every form, aspect and quality, through music, art, ritual, mantra and meditation. She is honoured in women, the Earth, nature and the transcendent beyond all expression. Her worship is full of splendour, delight, mystery and wonder.

The mythical aspects have been dealt in other works at length, I would rather focus on the social aspects of the origin of Durga puja in Bengal. For a brief introduction, I would return to the mythical sources to link in my arguments. The political background was rather provided in details in the second chapter. Nadia as a district would play a major role in general. I would also provide information about the societal organizations existing in Bengal during that time.

In Bengal, during the medieval period, the challenge provoked by the Islamic intrusion into the socio-religious life led the conservative Hindu brahmins tried to revitalize the Hinduism by composing texts. The
